Desinger Drugs Return

of the early 21st Century has become a bastion of the Roman Catholic Church. The combination of a large immigrant population and traditional Spanish heritage, and the outspoken faith of celebrities, have created a large percentage of Catholics in the nation's second largest city. That population base has been energized by a conservative, traditionalist movement that seeks to return the Catholic Church to its pre-Vatican II roots. Even more, Vatican III adherents, so called because they have petitioned the church to repeal Vatican II and return to traditional worship, are organizing to raise money, buy advertising, and stay active in their communities. "Los Angeles is a city founded on faith, and the city government is happy to see a resurgence of good ol' fashioned virtue." said Lieutenant Mayor, Monty Scott. "We're on the side of the lord! Vote Villaraigosa!"
